

LOCUM'S LETTER

One of the challenges facing Australia if not much of the Western world is the question of values and the broader one of ethics. We hear our politicians and other community leaders talking and commenting on Australian values listing them in a way that are broad in interpretation and mainly lacking in substance. I have written about this subject on my personal blog, in this month's Melbourne Anglican and in a recent letter to the Age newspaper. Where as in previous years Australian values were based or grounded on the Judaic-Christian ethic this appears to be no longer the case. This is not to say that we always practiced what we said we believed in. Remember the White Australia Policy, the treatment of indigenous people of this nation and today our response to asylum seekers and refugees. We do however take pride in the fact that we are a civilized Western democracy.

Today's Old Testament lesson recalls the giving of the Law to Israel, a gift to enliven and enlighten human kind. Increasingly it seems difficult to reconcile our Western ideas of freedom and individualism with the Old Testament law. Each day the Law is violated or modified to address a particular issue. On the one hand we condemn murder, on the other hand killing in war is justified for many different reasons. If we followed literally the commandment "You shall not kill" the recent debate around the Dying with Dignity legislation passed by the Victorian parliament may have taken on a different dimension. Likewise the responses to the sensitive issue of abortion and the rights of individuals.

I do not have any easy answers to the ethical issues we face as a

community. I do recognise however that our freedom is not absolute and it is important for the community to have rational and objective discussions on the many issues challenging who we are and what we believe. The challenge for us today as Christians is not to trivialize what God has given us as the way to find our true humanity. This will not be easy for the times have changed and the cross of Christ reminds us that love and justice is to be at the core of how we behave towards each other.

A reading from the book of Exodus

Exodus 20.1-17

Then God spoke all these words: I am the Lord your God, who brought you out of the land of Egypt, out of the house of slavery; you shall have no other gods before me. You shall not make for yourself an idol, whether in the form of anything that is in heaven above, or that is on the earth beneath, or that is in the water under the earth. You shall not bow down to them or worship them; for I the Lord your God am a jealous God, punishing children for the iniquity of parents, to the third and the fourth generation of those who reject me, but showing steadfast love to the thousandth generation of those who love me and keep my commandments. You shall not make wrongful use of the name of the Lord your God, for the Lord will not acquit anyone who misuses his name. Remember the sabbath day, and keep it holy. For six days you shall labour and do all your work. But the seventh day is a sabbath to the Lord your God; you shall not do any work—you, your son or your daughter, your male or female slave, your livestock, or the alien resident in your towns. For in six days the Lord made heaven and earth, the sea, and all that is in them, but rested the seventh day; therefore the Lord blessed the sabbath day and consecrated it. Honour your father and your mother, so that your days may be long in the land that the Lord your God is giving you. You shall not murder. You shall not commit adultery. You shall not steal. You shall not bear false witness against your neighbour. You shall not covet your neighbour's house; you shall not covet your neighbour's wife, or male or female slave, or ox, or donkey, or anything that belongs to your neighbour.



A Reading from the first book of Corinthians

1 Corinthians 1.18-25

For the message about the cross is foolishness to those who are perishing, but to us who are being saved it is the power of God.

For it is written,

‘I will destroy the wisdom of the wise,

and the discernment of the discerning I will thwart.’

Where is the one who is wise? Where is the scribe? Where is the debater of this age? Has not God made foolish the wisdom of the world?

For since, in the wisdom of God, the world did not know God through wisdom, God decided, through the foolishness of our proclamation, to save those who believe.

For Jews demand signs and Greeks desire wisdom, but we proclaim Christ crucified, a stumbling-block to Jews and foolishness to Gentiles,

but to those who are the called, both Jews and Greeks, Christ the power of God and the wisdom of God.

For God's foolishness is wiser than human wisdom, and God's weakness is stronger than human strength.

Glory to you, Lord Jesus Christ

The Passover of the Jews was near, and Jesus went up to Jerusalem. In the temple he found people selling cattle, sheep, and doves, and the money-changers seated at their tables. Making a whip of cords, he drove all of them out of the temple, both the sheep and the cattle. He also poured out the coins of the money-changers and overturned their tables. He told those who were selling the doves, 'Take these things out of here! Stop making my Father's house a market-place!' His disciples remembered that it was written, 'Zeal for your house will consume me.' The Jews then said to him, 'What sign can you show us for doing this?'
