#### SHOVEL READY

## St John's Bentleigh

The Reverend David Powys shares with us the following: St John's has been planning to upgrade its buildings for decades, and the shutdown has provided an unexpected but welcome window of opportunity. The hall asbestos roof has been replaced with Colourbond. The furnishings from the worship area have been moved to the hall to allow a complete internal repaint, carpeting of all floors, and an audio-visual system rework. Lockdown has provided opportunity to undertake key preparatory works for a 2021 building program of further works. In the coming weeks it is hoped to remove the hall stage, adjust an odd corner in that hall to free up space for a proposed new kitchen and bathroom, replace the badly worn timber floor in that building, and possibly even replace very inefficient louvre windows – all whilst our community hall users are away. Critical will be gaining a permit quickly. In our narthex, lighting has been upgraded and ugly old radiators removed in preparation for painting.

The video service 'notices' have included clips of the building works, which has meant that all can participate in the joy of seeing the buildings transformed. It was a steep learning curve producing a weekly recorded service, and we are embarking on our ninth this week. Music and readings have been recorded at various times, so 'continuity' has been difficult, but the offerings have nevertheless been widely appreciated, including by parishioners receiving the service on a USB stick. We have managed two Holy Communion services with communion being administered at front doors. A weekly 'Care Bulletin' has sought to maintain communication, and Parish Council and others are each making regular contact with allocated individuals on our roll. There have been blessings in adversity at St John's Bentleigh.
