ADAPTING TO NEW WAYS OF WORKING

St Augustine's Moreland

At St Augustine's we are missing the personal interactions of Sunday church gatherings but in this second lockdown phase we have a little more headspace to be creative about what we do with technology. We livestream our services from the church building to remind people of the time and space of our church community and during a trip to IKEA I bought a spinning wheel and then typed out all the names of our congregation and cut them up and stuck them to the wheel. Every week during the announcement time I spin the wheel and three or four people get a special shout out! The kids in the congregation in particular love it when their name comes up!

Recently we had an 'all ages' service on the book of Esther. Simone Turnbull, our children's and families worker, broke up the book of Esther into 15 sections and different families and people from church filmed

themselves acting out or reading the section and I edited it together to form our Bible reading for the day. It was a wonderful opportunity to see people we hadn't seen in a while and I even visited one of our elderly congregation member sat her nursing home and recorded her contribution. We also used the Youtube chat function along with the church mobile number to gather 'live' prayer requests from the people watching and we were able to pray together - it was great for others to see and engage with peoples prayer points, particularly the kids of the congregation! While technology can be frustrating - I think we have small tech issues every week - we are enjoying experimenting with the medium to help our community see and hear from each other and feel - The Reverend Angela Cook connected!
